The major strengths the school has

#### How could we further engage with parents?

The main suggestion was to invite parents into the class room more regularly but the largest section of parents believed that we were already engaging actively with parents enough.

There were lots of individual areas that parents would like more information on including trips, pastoral support for children, discrimination, PTA and school performance.

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### **Outcomes and Actions**

Parents were asked to comment throughout to help contextualise their answers and provide further depth. All comments have been reviewed in detail and we have incorporated many aspects that arose into action points for the school including:

#### Actions to implement before September:

- We will be providing information on ways parents can communicate with governors and building on positive feedback from Governor presence at parents evenings.
- We will be looking at our school website to check that the areas parents have asked for more information on are included and accessible.

## Actions to consider in the longer term:

- We will continue to develop our curriculum to enhance awareness of diversity and educate children about tackling discrimination.
- We will be looking at flexible working options to help encourage staff to return after maternity leave
- We will be reviewing the systems we use to reward children so that parents are more aware of their children's achievements and children feel motivated and valued

## Safeguarding and E-Safety

#### **NSPCC Pants**

You've probably already talked to your child about things like crossing the road safely. Talking to them about staying safe from sexual abuse is just as easy with NSPCC's PANTS rules. The rules help children to understand what is and isn't acceptable behaviour from others and gives children confidence in owning their own bodies. There are guides for parents on how to explain the issues without using scary words and even a Pantosaurus song. There is also guides for parents of children with special needs. ## WhatsApp

WhatsApp's minimum age of use is 16 years old. This age restriction is in place to help safeguard children. If you decide to allow your child access to WhatsApp please be extremely vigilant about the content they are viewing, groups they are part of and content they are posting.

If your child receives hurtful or inappropriate messages via WhatsApp via a group or an individual, in the first instance report this to WhatsApp. If the sender is under 16 (and therefore breaking the conditions of WhatsApp) their account can be closed down. Abusive and/or threatening messages can be reported to the Police on the 101 number. Please remind your child that we take bullying (in all its forms seriously) and will take action where we are alerted to it.
